Establish with the trainees ground rules regarding the interaction amongst them during the group work. Establish the number of people per group and the time allocated to each of the tasks while you present them.</li> <li>1.3. Present all the tasks. Each group will have to:</li> <li>1.3.1. Identify and define a problem to solve. <b>1.3.5.</b> Choose the best way to solve the problem.	
<b>1.3.6.</b> Present to all groups the results of the	
work done through a role-play.	
2. Tell trainees that you will support each group	
individually during the exercise. They can start	
their work. Remember groups individually about	
the time left for each task, if you see they are	
getting delayed.	
<b>3.</b> After the presentation of the role-plays,	
proceed to their evaluation. Establish previously	
how you will give trainees feedback and assess	
the assignment. Consider making self and peer	
assessments.
